

## **Colin and Ailsa Turbayne International Berkeley Essay Prize Competition**

Professor and Mrs. Colin Turbayne have established a Berkeley Prize Essay competition in conjunction with the Philosophy Department at the University of Rochester.

The next deadline for submitting papers is November 1, 1991. Essays should be new and unpublished, written in English and not exceed 5,000 words in length. Submissions will be judged by members of a review board selected by the Department of Philosophy at the University of Rochester. The winner whose name will be announced March 1 of the following year will receive a prize of \$1,000.00.

## **Leibniz Society of North America Ninth Annual Essay Competition**

The Leibniz Society of North America announces its ninth annual essay competition. The prize essay will be read before the Society at the 1991 Eastern Division APA Meeting. Essays may be on any aspect of Leibniz' philosophy. Full scholarly apparatus is not required. Entries should be from twenty to twenty-five (double-spaced) pages and should be submitted by July 1, 1991. Judges reserve the right not to name a winner in the event that no submission is deemed of sufficient quality.

*Hume Studies* is devoted to historical and systematic research on David Hume.

Manuscripts should be typewritten, double-spaced, xerox or ribbon copy, on white bond paper 8 1/2 x 11 inches with wide margins. If papers have been typed on an IBM-compatible word processor, contributors should submit a copy of the word processing disk as well as a printed copy of the paper. The disk should be labelled with (1) the name of the file and, (2) the name of the software program. If an unusual software program is used, please include an ASCII version of the file as well as the original file. Footnotes should be assembled on separate sheets and placed at the end of the article. Contributors are encouraged to limit papers to 15 pages of text. Receipt of manuscripts will be acknowledged, but manuscripts cannot be returned unless accompanied by an addressed envelope and Canadian postage or International Reply Coupons for those living outside Canada. Contributors should keep a copy of their manuscript.

*Hume Studies* is published twice a year in April and November. Manuscripts will be accepted in English, French, German, and Italian. Contributors are requested to use the Selby-Bigge editions of the *Treatise* and the *Enquiries* and the Kemp Smith edition of the *Dialogues*. Quotations should be verified carefully and punctuation and spelling should not be modified since there is at present no standardization. Authors of papers published in *Hume Studies* will receive *gratis* five copies of the issue. Additional copies may be purchased by making arrangements with the Editor.
