The Hume Society is pleased to announce a **Call for Papers and Panel Suggestions**. Papers bearing some relation to the theme will be especially welcome; however, papers on any aspect of Hume’s life and works will be considered. Papers should be no more than thirty minutes reading length with self-references deleted for blind reviewing; the author’s name should appear only on a front cover sheet. Papers may be submitted in French, Spanish, German or English, but must include an English-language abstract. Authors are requested to submit papers and abstracts as e-mail attachments in MS Word or rich text format. The Hume Society has set aside up to \$2,000 U.S. for the support of graduate students reading papers at the annual Hume Society meetings, to be given at the discretion of the Conference Directors to those whose papers have been accepted through the normal vetting process. Lodging in Tokyo

The Shinagawa Prince Hotel is a huge international hotel with a variety of business and leisure facilities. The hotel is the best accommodation for a conference at Keio University, just ten minutes by train which departs every two minutes. Special shuttle-bus service for the conference participants is negotiable. The current room rate per person per night is from 9,800 yen (\$82.00 U.S.) for single occupancy, and from 7250 yen (\$60.00 U.S.) for double occupancy. A room-sharing option will be included in the registration form. A special conference rate is to be negotiated with the hotel.
